# OSBCU Convention 2021

Day 1 - Thursday, March 25



## **Addresses**



In a video message, **CUPE National President Mark Hancock** addressed delegates at OSBCU's virtual conference: "The pandemic exposed a lot of the inequities in our society. ... But over the past year, we have shown just how essential this work truly is to helping kids get the best start possible - during normal times, and during a global pandemic. Our members in the education sector went above and beyond to support their students and their communities. ... The

pandemic didn't stop us from providing valued services to the public. And it didn't stop us from doing our critical work as a union either."



**CUPE Ontario President Fred Hahn** spoke to delegates after "a long and tough year" in which the pandemic "laid bare how critical public education services are to students, parents, our communities and the economy." He detailed the differences "between the reality of what we're all facing dealing with COVID and the picture being painted by the Minister of Education and Premier Ford... even as they sit on

billions of dollars... never actually spent." He hailed "the solidarity and power you've built in the OSBCU" and urged delegates to mobilize to defeat the PC government in the next election: "We need to pull out every stop - do everything we can - to defeat Doug Ford and make real change."



Marit Stiles, MPP for Davenport and the Official Opposition NDP Critic for Education, thanked CUPE education workers for their compassion, resilience and hard work and recognized OSBCU for its leadership and solidarity. She spoke about Ford government's dismal performance around school reopenings as a sign of what's ahead. She warned, "Stephen Lecce and Doug Ford were cutting education before the pandemic and now they're already looking to return to

those cuts. We can't let them get away with it.... Together, we can fight for the dignity and fair pay that you deserve, and the stronger public education system that our children, and our economy, rely on."



CUPE National Secretary-Treasurer Charles Fleury told OSBCU delegates: "The National Strike Fund has over

\$124 million. With the largest strike fund in the country, locals across Canada know that CUPE National can support them when they need it. It is my responsibility to make sure CUPE National has the resources to offer the services our members count on. With CUPE's solid financial foundation, I am positive we will be able to face the challenges ahead."



CUPE Ontario Secretary-Treasurer Candace Rennick paid a touching tribute to the education workers, saying

"I want you to know that your contributions are not going unnoticed in the eyes of children and families. Despite all the obstacles the Ford government put in the way, you have kept students safe. You've made it possible for them to keep learning in the classroom and on-line. On behalf of all parents and members of CUPE Ontario, thank you. ... I want to encourage you to think big and be bold. Because while the pandemic has caused devastation, it has also created unprecedented opportunities to achieve great things."

# **Reports**



In her **President's Report, Laura Walton** looked back
on the trials and
achievements of a year made
even more challenging by
COVID-19: "Three hundred
and seventy-six days later,
our members continue to go
above and beyond,
expanding their repertoire to
serve our students, our
schools and communities

safely. And they do all this in spite of a government that has failed to provide a real and sustainable plan to keep us all safe while undermining the real key services we provide." She emphasized OSBCU's commitment to being the political voice for CUPE school board members and to raising the profile of education workers and their roles. Her report also detailed OSBCU's success in working with allies and providing open and frequent communications on a range of different platforms. A 50 percent increase in central disputes was evidence that "local leaders are holding your employers accountable," said Walton. She also warned about the coming fight over online

learning, which could lead to "layoffs, privatization, and funding cuts." Finally, she also noted that that it's just over a year until OSBCU serves notice for the next round of central bargaining in 2022, concluding, "We are on the brink of something amazing, and I cannot wait to get started, together."



**Tammy Graham, Secretary-Treasurer of OSBCU,** is positive about council's financial picture: "The OSBCU is moving into the next fiscal year in a solid financial position. We are well suited to prepare for and mobilize members in the lead up to the critical round of Bargaining in 2022."



# **Staff presentation**



CUPE researcher Dan Crow spoke to delegates about the importance of "acting locally" to support central bargaining and enforcing the central agreement in the workplace. He linked members' grassroots action in the community to education funding and policy and urged education workers to use their political power to influence trustees and MPPs and to build relationships with community allies, including parents', students' and community groups. He concluded: "The next round of bargaining is going to be difficult once again, but with strong local unions and rank-and-file activism we can build the kind of strength needed to win big at the central table."

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
